Tips:

- Numbers 13-14 is a major milestone in Scripture. God had already promised that He would lead Israel to victory into the Promised Land. God called for 12 spies to explore the land and determine how big of a miracle it would be. The majority of spies, however, claimed Israel would be unable to win because the inhabitants were stronger than them (thus discounting God). God received their unbelief as a rejection of Him. An entire generation subsequently died in the wilderness while they raised a new generation who would believe God.
- Numbers 13-14 teaches us to believe God's promises even if our human wisdom contradicts them (Heb 3:16-19).
- Ancient inscriptions located between the psalms attribute 12 of the psalms to Asaph, second only to David with 73 attributed psalms. Asaph was a musician from the tribe of Levi assigned to praise God before the Ark of the Covenant (1Chr 16:4-6).
