Tips:

- Isaiah used clothing as a metaphor for one’s spiritual state. Christ clothes Himself in armor to win salvation (Isa 59:16-17). God clothes the saved with robes of righteousness (Isa 61:10). Sinners clothe themselves in “filthy rags” stained by sins (Isa 64:6).
- Isaiah ends with a vision of the new heavens and new earth for God’s people (Isa 65, 2Pet 3:13, Rev 21:1-2) and eternal judgment for those who reject Him (Isa 66, Rev 20:11-15).
- The book of Jeremiah is the second of five “Major Prophets” (referring to book length, not importance). Jeremiah was a priest also called to be a prophet (Jer 1:1).
- Acts 15 records how the church resolved the early tension between Jewish and Gentile believers.
- Acts 16:8-11 records a key moment in history when missionaries took the good news of Jesus from Asia to Europe. Notice how Paul adapted his preaching style to his audience without changing the core of the gospel message.
