Tips:

- The book of Nahum warns of God’s judgment against Nineveh (in modern northern Iraq), the capital of the powerful Assyrian empire. Nineveh had turned to God over 100 years earlier under Jonah’s ministry, but then returned to its wicked ways.
- The book of Habakkuk contains Habakkuk’s dialogue with God. In it, Habakkuk questions how a good and holy God could allow sinful Judah to be judged by Babylon, a nation that is far worse.
- The book of Zephaniah was written by a relative of King Josiah as the good king tried to reform the wicked kingdom of Judah. Zephaniah warned of God’s wrath and judgment to come.
- John, the last survivor of the 12 apostles, wrote the book of Revelation. He was exiled to the island of Patmos (Rev 1:9). It is God’s final inspired Scripture. It reveals the last days in three sections (Rev 1:19): what John saw of Christ (Rev 1), Christ’s churches (Rev 2-3), and Christ’s end times revealing (Rev 4-22).

Look for this:

- 351. How the nations of the world will someday seek God (Mic 4); What John said Jesus did for us (Rev 1)
- 352. What Micah says the Lord requires of His people (Mic 6); What the church of Laodicea thought they were (Rev 3)
- 353. What Nahum said about the anger of God (Nah 1); Why the Lamb was worthy to open the scroll's seals (Rev 5)
- 354. What questions Habakkuk asked of God (Hab 1); What the people did day and night in God's temple (Rev 7)
- 355. What Zephaniah foretold about "the day of the Lord" (Zeph 1); What John was forbidden to write (Rev 10)
- 356. How God planned to restore and purify His people (Zeph 3); How people respond to the two witnesses' deaths (Rev 11)
