
2Chronicles: Let's Talk

This Grace@Home Let's Talk Guide provides discussion questions and activities that you may use to facilitate conversations about God and His Word in your home. The focus is on those chapters that are most likely to promote meaningful conversations for all ages of family members.

2Chronicles 1

Have all family members share their heart's desire. Pray that you will desire what God desires for you.

Questions

1. What did Solomon ask for from God? Did God answer his request? How?
2. If God asked you the same question, how would you respond?
3. What did God give Solomon besides what he requested? Why?
4. What is the danger of having too many riches? Do you think this happened to Solomon?

2Chronicles 3

If you were going to build a temple to God, what would it look like? Draw a picture.

Questions

1. What words come to mind to describe the temple that Solomon built for God?
2. What colors would you find in the temple? What does that make you think of?
3. What details are included in the making of the temple? Why do you think God wants us to know these details?
4. In 1Corinthians 6:19 it says that our body is also the temple of God. What things might we do (or not do) to keep our body special (holy) for God?

2Chronicles 5

Play catch. The thrower proclaims: "He is good," and the catcher replies: "His love endures forever." How many times can you throw it back and forth without dropping it?

Questions

1. What did Solomon do while he brought the ark to the temple? Why do you think he did that?
2. What noises, smells, and sights do you think you would have noticed if you had been in the crowd on the day the temple was dedicated?
3. If you had to come up with a one sentence chant or "chorus" to sing to God, what would it be?
4. What happened at the end of the chapter? If we are the temple of God today, could this ever apply to us? If so, how?

2Chronicles 12

Turn your back on one of your adult family members and talk to everyone else but them. How did that make them feel? Read about Rehoboam doing the same thing to God.

Questions

1. When Rehoboam felt strong what mistake did he make? What happened when Rehoboam forgot about God?
2. How did Rehoboam later turn back to God? How did God deliver him?
3. What is the difference between forgiveness and consequences? What negative consequences did Rehoboam still have from turning away from God in the first place?
4. How can having needs in our life where we have to depend on God be good for us? Do you have any needs in your life right now? Take a moment to thank God for them.

2Chronicles 15

Work on a task together such as pulling weeds or doing dishes. As you work, practice this verse: "Be strong, and do not let your hands be weak; for your work shall be rewarded." Then enjoy a treat!

Questions

1. When will the Lord be with Asa?
2. How did Asa help the people return to following God? What did God give them as a result?
3. How can you follow God with all your heart? Are there any idols in your life (things you put ahead of God) that you need to throw away?
4. Asa helped the nation of Israel follow God. What people do you know that can help you follow God (think both adults and kids)?

2Chronicles 16

Have everyone share one thing they love and one they hate. How well do you know God's heart? Name three things He loves. What are three things He hates?

Questions

1. When he was under a lot of stress and felt threatened, what mistake did Asa make in this chapter? What should he have done instead?
2. Have you ever relied on friends or things you could see instead of God? What can you do to remember to go to God first?
3. Did Asa respond well to the prophet (seer)? What did he do? What should he have done?
4. We have a tendency to put a "good" or "bad" hat on people, especially characters in the Bible. How does Asa's life show us that every decision we make is a unique chance to follow God? Have you chosen God's way lately?

2Chronicles 20

One person start a tickle chain where everybody gets one tickle, but don't spill your drink! When one person pleads for mercy, the other stops and says, "Praise the Lord. For His mercy endures forever."

Questions

1. What did Jehoshaphat do when he was afraid? How is this different from Asa yesterday?
2. What can you tell Jehoshaphat believed about God based on his prayer? Do you believe the same about God? What do your prayers tell you about what you believe about God?
3. How did God answer his prayers? Jehoshaphat still had to choose to believe God would deliver him. How did he show his faith in God's promise?
4. God started setting ambushes after the people started doing what? What does that tell you about the importance of praise? Do you regularly praise Him?

2Chronicles 24

Take some Legos and build your own version of the temple. While you are doing so, share what you remember about its origins and various states of repair.

Questions

1. What did Joash want to do? How did he go about doing it?
2. Who was Joash's mentor? How did the king change when his mentor died?
3. How do you make a disciple of Jesus and not just someone who follows you?
4. What bad consequence happened when Joash started listening to other leaders that didn't follow God? What does that tell you about the importance of picking good friends?

2Chronicles 26

Lepers were isolated. Today many people in nursing homes are lonely and do not receive visitors. Write some cards after dinner you can deliver to a nursing home near you.

Questions

1. How did God use Uzziah at the start of his reign? What good things did he do?
2. Uzziah was a good king until what happened? Can you remember any other times in our readings this year where men started relying on themselves rather than God and their results?
3. If you had been the priest watching Uzziah start to make wrong choices what would you have done?
4. What was the consequence of Uzziah's sin? Did he still reign as king?

2Chronicles 29

In this reading, they cleansed the house of the Lord. Can every family member have a part in cleaning your home?

Questions

1. Besides repairing the temple, Hezekiah spoke with the Levites. What did he tell them?
2. How did the Levites respond? What does that tell you about their heart?
3. Describe the scene as Hezekiah led Israel in worship. Have you ever been a part of something where you really felt like you were worshipping God? If so, explain.
4. People with what kind of hearts brought offerings? What kind of heart do you think you have?
